"Perspectives on Global Health" Sir George Alleyne



Our May Luncheon will feature a physician of international importance. He will share perspectives from a career of public service in health. Sir George Alleyne is Director Emeritus, Pan American Health Organization (PAHO). He served two four-year terms from 1995 to 2002 in the position of Regional Director at PAHO, which is also the WHO's Regional Office for the Americas. In October 2003 he was appointed Chancellor of the University of the West Indies. He currently holds an Adjunct professorship on the Bloomberg School of Public Health,

Johns Hopkins University.

From 2003 through 2010 he served as the UN Secretary General's Special Envoy for HIV/AIDS in the Caribbean region. In that position he was responsible for ensuring follow-up to the United Nations General Assembly special session on HIV/AIDS and the Pan-Caribbean Partnership against HIV/AIDS, in the Caribbean region.

A native of Barbados, Sir George studied medicine at the University of the West Indies and graduated as the gold medalist in 1957. He was made a Knight Bachelor by Queen Elizabeth II in 1990, and in 2001 was awarded the Order of the Caribbean Community, the highest honor that can be conferred on a Caribbean national.

Born a Crime



This book details Noah's growing up in post-apartheid South Africa. As the light-skinned product of a white father and black mother, he never fit well into the racial schemes introduced after apartheid. Even under apartheid there was trouble fitting in, because it was a crime for him to be born as a mixed-race baby (hence the title of the book).

In large part, the book is a tribute to Noah's mother, Patricia Nombuyiselo, who grew up in a hut with 14 occupants. She was a fiercely religious woman who took her son to three churches every Sunday, a prayer meeting on Tuesday, Bible study on Wednesday and youth church on Thursday, even when the Africans were rioting in the streets and most people were cowering in their homes.

The book opens with young Noah being thrown out of a minibus by his mother, because she thought the driver, from another tribe, was trying to kill them. Later in life young Trevor is caught stealing a car, and his mother lays down the law about crime and punishment. She was an important figure in his becoming a man, but she had many problems of her own. Years after the minibus incident, Noah's stepfather shot her in the head while she was returning from church with her family. Young Noah developed a social and mental agility that helped him during these times of trial, whether he was talking in their own language with different tribes, or risking arrest and violence by selling illegal bootleg CDs in dangerous neighborhoods. Through it all, his mother administered tough love and "old-school, Old Testament discipline."

However, growing up was a little hard. My mom was a single parent and worked two full-time jobs. She was away a lot, and at the time I felt that going to college would be another burden for my mom to handle. Now that I am an adult and have have children of my own, I want to be a positive role model for them. I discuss with them daily about their ambitions and future goals and show them that I, too, have goals for my future.

My interests in becoming a nurse led me to begin taking classes at Montgomery College. My intentions are to fulfill all the necessary course requirements at Montgomery College and then transfer to The University of Maryland School of Nursing at The Universities at Shady Grove. College life is one of the most intriguing experiences that I have encountered, aside from being a parent. The enrichment of knowledge is one that I have longed for. Aside from attending classes at Montgomery College, I spend my free time volunteering at various places. I am a PTA parent for both an elementary school and middle school that my kids attend. As a PTA parent, I engage in conversations about this school year's budget and how to coordinate school activities throughout the year. In the summer I volunteer my time at the Flower Hill Swim Team, where I help the team gain funds to keep the cost of enrollment down for swim team members. Throughout the year, I spend my Sundays volunteering at the Church of Redeemer, where I am an usher and greeter."
