# National and International Perspectives: Politics as We Approach Mid-term Elections

Mark Medish, one of our most popular regular speakers, will share his insights into US policies throughout the world as well as perspectives on current US politics as we approach the mid-term elections. He is founder of Keep Our Republic, a non-partisan civic action group dedicated to election and transition integrity. He also served at The White House as Special Assistant to President Bill Clinton and Senior Director for Russian, Ukrainian, and Eurasian Affairs on the National Security Council. He served at the U.S. Treasury as Deputy Assistant

Secretary for International Affairs, under Secretaries Robert Rubin and Lawrence Summers. Medish was educated at Georgetown, Harvard, and Oxford. He has held Fulbright, Luce, Mellon, and Shintaro Abe scholarships.

Dear Bethesda-Chevy Chase AAUW Friends,

Those of you lucky enough to attend our September meeting, featuring our own Alice Schelling, were treated to an inspiring session in which Alice read from her book **Hiding Alinka** and shared memories of her time as a hidden child during World War II. More than 60 people attended the meeting. For any who were unable to attend (COVID or other challenges!), I was able to record it on my iPad. Please let me know if you would like me to send it to you. Alice shared stories about disguising her Jewish heritage, even attending a Catholic girls' residential school. She recalls this as one of the times she felt safest, although she pointed out that if any



of the nuns were found to be hiding a Jewish student they almost certainly would have been executed. This was a great act of courage on their part. She also recounted coming across a group of Jews being led to a concentration camp and already emaciated and near death. She told of the horses being ridden by the German soldiers defecating near the prisoners and the prisoners' eagerness in eating the excrement, since they had not received any food. These stories brought to life a terrible time in the world's past, but also a time when the human spirit among those threatened or executed soared.

As you are well aware, Alice and her parents survived, although many relatives and friends were lost, and we are grateful she could tell her story and share it with us. The book is

We will hear from Donna Smith of Compassion & Choices who will outline efforts to legalize efforts for people to have the right to participate in their own end of life choices. She will share plans for introduction of legislation in the 2023

Maryland legislative session.

Compassion & Choices improves care, expands options and empowers everyone to chart their end-of-life journey. They are a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization and have 450,000 supporters active in all 50 states, Washington, D.C., Guam and Puerto Rico.

Women's Issues in Maryland: A Look Ahead to the Maryland Legislative Session Senator Susan Lee, District 16, Maryland

Susan C. Lee represents District 16, which includes Bethesda, Chevy Chase, Friendship Heights, Potomac, Rockville, Cabin John, and Glen Echo. She was elected to the Maryland House of Delegates in 2002 and to the Senate in 2014 to represent



District 16 and has been described as the General Assembly's leader on cyber security and innovation, identity theft, online fraud, and consumer protection issues. Maryland's strongest advocate for women's issues of concern to AAUW, Susan led efforts to pass an aggressive agenda of legislation to fight domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking; economically empower women, children and families; secure funding for statewide rape crisis centers; and authorize the placing a statue of Marylander and American hero Harriet Tubman in the United States Capitol. Susan

also is a champion of education, the environment, public safety, civil rights, transportation, quality health care, telemedicine, bioscience, clean energy, and emerging technologies.

Set in the U.S. in an unspecified future, the book is told from the point of view of Klara, a solar-powered AF (Artificial Friend), who is chosen by Josie, a sickly child, to be her companion.

The novel was longlisted for the 2021 Booker Prize.

About the author: Kazuo Ishiguro was born in Nagasaki, Japan, in 1954 and moved to Britain at the age of five. His eight previous works of fiction have earned him many honors around the world, including the Nobel Prize in Literature and the Booker Prize. His work has been translated into over fifty languages and The Remains of the Day and Never Let Me Go, both made into acclaimed films, have sold over a million copies each in Faber

editions. He was given a knighthood in 2018 for Services to Literature. He also holds the decorations of Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres from France and the Order of the Rising Sun, Gold and Silver Star from Japan.
