Readings from Hiding Alinka

Speaker: Alice C. Schelling

Alinka, now Alice C. Schelling, member of the Bethesda-Chevy Chase AAUW Branch, is the author of <u>Hiding Alinka</u>. She came to the US when, at the end of WWII, her father became Poland's Director of UNRRA under his assumed name of Zygmunt Madzelewski. Alice Schelling's survival as a Polish Jewish child during the Holocaust meant acquiring a new identify, a new persona, and spending the fragmented war years moving along from Gentile family to Gentile family including time in a convent and a final episode of forced labor in Germany. She will read from her book, published by Politics & Prose in Washington, DC., and share memories in conversation with our members. She lives at Fox Hill and is the widow of Nobel Laureate Thomas C. Schelling.

October 8, 2022 National and International Perspectives: Politics as We Approach Mid-term Elections Mark Medish



Mark Medish, one of our most popular regular speakers, will share his insights into US policies throughout the world as well as perspectives on current US politics as we approach the mid-term elections. He is founder of Keep Our Republic, a non-partisan civic action group dedicated to election and transition integrity. He also served at The White House as Special Assistant to President Bill Clinton and Senior Director for Russian,

Ukrainian, and Eurasian Affairs on the National Security Council. He served at the U.S. Treasury as Deputy Assistant Secretary for International Affairs, under Secretaries Robert Rubin and Lawrence Summers. Medish was educated at Georgetown, Harvard, and Oxford. He has held Fulbright, Luce, Mellon, and Shintaro Abe scholarships.

November 12, 2022 Charting Our End-of-Life Journey

Our AAUW branch members have expressed an interest in learning about and



advocating for society that affirms life and accepts the inevitability of death, embraces expanded options for compassionate dying, and empowers everyone to choose end-of-life care that reflects their values, priorities, and beliefs. We will hear from Donna Smith of Compassion & Choices who will outline efforts to legalize efforts for people to have the right to participate in their own end of life choices. She will share plans for introduction of legislation in the 2023

Maryland legislative session.

Compassion & Choices improves care, expands options and empowers everyone to chart their end-of-life journey. They are a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization and have 450,000 supporters active in all 50 states, Washington, D.C., Guam and Puerto Rico.

Women's Issues in Maryland: A Look Ahead to the Maryland Legislative Session Senator Susan Lee, District 16, Maryland

Susan C. Lee represents District 16, which includes Bethesda, Chevy Chase, Friendship Heights, Potomac, Rockville, Cabin John, and Glen Echo. She was elected to the Maryland House of Delegates in 2002 and to the Senate in 2014 to represent



District 16, and has been described as the General Assembly's leader on cyber security and innovation, identity theft, online fraud, and consumer protection issues. Maryland's strongest advocate for women's issues of concern to AAUW, Susan led efforts to pass an aggressive agenda of legislation to fight domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking; economically empower women, children and families; secure funding for statewide rape crisis centers; and authorize the placing a statue of Marylander and American hero Harriet Tubman in the United States Capitol. Susan

also is a champion of education, the environment, public safety, civil rights, transportation, quality health care, telemedicine, bioscience, clean energy, and emerging technologies.

From Amazon: The Lincoln Highway might just be one of the best novels of this decade, which is a feat considering *A Gentleman in Moscow*, also holds that distinction (in this reviewer's mind, anyway). Set in the 1950s, *The Lincoln Highway* is filled with nostalgia as well as the gentle naïveté and hijinks



of those who are young, optimistic, and on a mission. The story follows four boys who set out to travel the country in search of a fresh start: Emmett and Billy want to find their mother who left them when they were young, and Duchess and Woolly are on the hunt for a stashed wad of cash. Sometimes their dreams are aligned but often they are not. In other words, adventure ensues: There's train hopping and car stealing, and with that comes the inevitability of trouble sparked from both good and bad intentions. Each of these young men is chasing his dreams, but their pasts—whether violent or sad—are never far behind. A remarkable work of storytelling that is a 2021 favorite.
