Challenges in the Health Care System: Suburban Hospital Perspectives

LeighAnn Sidone, President and Chief Operating Officer, Suburban Hospital

The national health care system, including hospitals, is facing increasing challenges in terms of providing needed care, staying financially viable, providing top level medical



care, working with insurance companies, running trauma centers, serving the broader community, and many other challenges. Dr. LeighAnn Sidone, D.N.P., R.N., C.E.N.P., is Suburban Hospital's president and chief operating office and coordinates the hospital's responses to the many challenges.

She oversees Suburban Hospital's inpatient and ambulatory services and leads the hospital's quality and safety programs and financial initiatives. She also works with Suburban Hospital's Board of Trustees and Johns Hopkins Medicine executive leadership to facilitate strategic growth in the National Capital

Region, while ensuring that plans align with and support Suburban's daily operations. Suburban Hospital is part of the Johns Hopkins Medical System.

LeighAnn has more than 30 years of service to Suburban, primarily as a nurse and head of nursing services at the hospital, beginning her career as a patient care technician at the hospital. As vice president of nursing and chief nursing officer, she oversaw all nursing activity at the hospital, including quality improvement, nursing standards and professional practice. Under her leadership, Suburban Hospital achieved American Nurses Credentialing Center (ANCC) Magnet designation in 2019 and 2024, a distinction awarded to fewer than 10% of hospitals in the United States. In the most recent designation review, Dr. Sidone's leadership was cited as one of the organization's nine exemplars. The national reviewers called out specifically her exceptional communication skills, impressive visibility within the organization and her commitment to a culture of caring for both patients and team members.

"When I first landed in America three decades ago, I would never have imagined that one day I would be elected to the Maryland State House. A story like mine is only possible in America where people would vote for a name they can't even pronounce! As an immigrant who came here by choice, I know why we must be competitive and inclusive at the same time." – Lily Qi

Lily Qi was born in Shanghai, China on November 4, 1963. She grew up during the height of the Cultural Revolution, during which her family was persecuted. She migrated to Indiana on February 22, 1989, where she attended Manchester University on a sponsorship from Manchester professor Al Deeter, for whom she worked as a translator



when he visited Shanghai. While at Manchester, she met her future husband, Yu "Phil" Peng. She graduated from Manchester University in 1991, earning a M.A. degree in communication studies. [5] Afterwards, the couple worked at universities in Athens, Ohio, and Morgantown, West Virginia. In 1997, the couple moved to Montgomery County, Maryland after Qi accepted a position working on multicultural affairs at American University. She became a citizen of the United States in 1999 and earned a M.B.A. degree in marketing and

global information technology management in 2001 while working at American

University. After graduating, Qi began working on economic development for a couple of nonprofit organizations.

She represents the 15th legislative district in the Maryland House of Delegates and previously worked as a chief administrator for economic development under Montgomery County Executive Ike Leggett.

President's Letter

Dear AAUW Friends.

As I write this, I am reflecting on my personal experience as a delegate to the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (CSW). This group meets in March each year, and I have had the privilege of attending for three years in person (and the first year, virtual because of Covid).

These are difficult times to represent the United States to a global community. The current US Administration has criticized the United Nations for activities related to diversity, inclusion and equity - cornerstones of the CSW agenda. AAUW and countless other US organizations which support women are making their voices heard. Our sisters in Africa and elsewhere lament the end of USAID support for their communities. We often exaggerate that people are dying from policy decisions; in this case, we actually do know that people are dying from AIDs, from starvation, from neglect. We need to hold our government accountable. From my Canadian friends also attending CSW, I was offered a maple leaf flag to wear to avoid criticism; I declined, proud of our country's history and passionate about continuing our long fight for women's equality. AAUW is taking a lead in protesting changes related to women's issues – particularly those affecting universities and education.

As we see the beloved cherry blossoms throughout the metro area, we are reminded that spring does come – and with it, promise of new beginnings.

Our program year ends in May, and we have two outstanding educational programs upcoming. Leighann Sidone, president of Suburban Hospital, will share her perspectives on health care issues and how one hospital is responding to the challenges. Delegate Lily Qi will share her amazing and inspiring story of an immigrant who not only found her niche in the U.S., but rose to become an elected official in Maryland. As we plan to our next program year, beginning in September, I urge you to share with us issues you would like to see on our Bethesda-Chevy Chase AAUW agenda. We share an interest in lifelong learning, and our branch is committed to providing opportunities for our members – and any others who wish to join us – to learn about important issues facing all of us.
